For English this week, I am going to allow you flexibility in your writing task. All writing tasks are linked to VE Day, so you are going to need to do some research about it first!

I am going to set three writing tasks linked to VE Day. You may choose to complete one, two or even all of the tasks!

- Choose one person from the street party (picture at the top) and write a diary entry about how they felt about the war ending.
- Research a WW2 veteran a person who is an ex-member of the armed forces and create a fact file about them. Include details of the force they worked in, where they were stationed, and in particular, any significant memories of VE Day they had. You might choose Captain Tom Moore to write about.
- Write a newspaper report covering the events of VE Day in 1945.

On this document, I have included a success criteria and the beginning of a WAGOLL for each of the writing genres.

Remember to plan your writing first. Take your time drafting, then editing and improving before writing your final draft.

Captain Tom Moore

Captain Tom Moore is a 99-year-old army veteran, who served in India and Burma during World War 2. He is known worldwide for his current fundraising efforts - raising a staggering £29 million for NHS charities in the United Kingdom.

Personal Life

Mr Moore was born in Keighley, West Yorkshire on 30 April 1920. He was educated at Keighley Grammar School where he completed an apprenticeship in civil engineering. In 1968, he married his wife, Pamela, and had two daughters, Lucy and Hannah.

Military Career

At the beginning of World War 2, Moore enlisted in the 8th Battalion (Duke of Wellington's Regiment) and was stationed in Cornwall.
