<u>Year 6 – Spring Block 5 – Hyphens – Recognising Hyphens to Avoid Ambiguity</u>

Notes and Guidance:

- Hyphens can be used to join or separate words or parts of words, or to avoid ambiguity.
- Hyphens are sometimes necessary in words with prefixes in order to avoid confusion with words spelt in a similar way, for example: re-formed and reformed. Where a prefix ends with a vowel and the root word also begins with a vowel, a hyphen is used to avoid two vowels sitting next to each other, such as co-operate.
- In this step, children will identify hyphens and recognise the different meanings that can be conveyed in words and sentences with or without a hyphen, for example: man eating shark versus man-eating shark.

Focused Questions

- What are the different meanings in this sentence when the hyphen is used or not used?
- Does the meaning of the word change when you remove the hyphen? Explain how.
