The World in the Future

By 2050:

- The world population is likely to grow from close to 7 billion to 8-10 billion.
- CO₂ levels will be twice the level they were in 1800.

What might the impact of these changes be?

- One in every 6 people will be aged over 65.
- Solar power could generate around 1/4 of the world's energy.
- Nearly half of the Amazon rainforest will have been deforested.
- The final reserves of oil will have been extracted in the Middle East.

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For each fact, identify how the change might affect life in the UK.

One in every 6 people will be aged over 65.

Rainfall is now 20% more intense than before.

Global temperature rises have led to the development of wine-producing regions in Northern Britain.

The UK is now the most populated country in Western Europe, with more people than France (72 million), Germany (71 million) and Spain (52 million).





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London's total metropolitan area now encompasses the entire southern half of England.

Britain now has a Mediterranean climate and is engaged in a food-sharing process with its neighbour Ireland.

Britain becomes self-sufficient in food production after sports fields, parks, gardens, golf courses and other green areas of land are converted to farmland for crop growing and biofuel sites.

50% of amphibians have disappeared due to pollution, disease and loss of habitat including many previously common species of frogs, toads, and newts. More than 20% of bird species have been lost, and around 15% of plants.
