### **FIGURATIVE LANGUAGE**

Remember, figurative language is the umbrella term for the use of similes, metaphors, personification and onomatopoeia.

### ONOMATOPOEIA (words that describe a sound).

(whizz, pop, zoom, drip, crack, boom).

### SIMILES

A **simile** is a figure of speech that directly compares two different things. The **simile** is usually in a phrase that begins with the words "as" or "like."

The girl ran **as** fast **as** lightning.

The boy roared **like** a lion.

She was as pretty as a picture.

### **METAPHORS**

A **metaphor** is a figure of speech that is used to make a comparison between two things that aren't alike but do have something in common. ... You may have to work a little to find the meaning in a metaphor.

The shop was a goldmine.

The footballer was a shooting machine.

The stars are diamonds in the sky.

### PERSONIFICATION

Personification is when you give an animal or object qualities or abilities that only a human can have. Writers use personification to bring non-human things to life. It helps us better understand the writer's message.

The sun **smiled** in the sky. The wind **whistled** through the trees. The rain **danced** on the window.

## **EXPANDED NOUN PHRASES**

### **Constructing an Expanded Noun Phrase**

A noun is a thing, person or idea. An expanded noun phrase provides extra information about the noun. You can use a determiner, adjectives and a prepositional phrase within your expanded noun phrase to describe and specify details about the noun.

**Fronted adverbials** are words or phrases at the beginning of a sentence, used to describe the action that follows. They are always followed by a comma.
